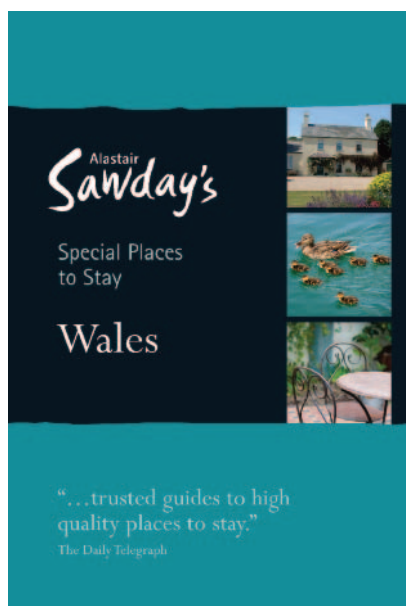

Escape Boutique B&B

Llandudno is a holiday town, built by Victorians as a place to take the air. Away from the crowds, Escape stands high on the hill with its carved fireplaces, stained-glass windows and wrought iron veranda intact. Not that you should expect Victoriana. Interiors have been transformed into a contemporary world of wooden floors, neutral colours, Italian leather and glass chandeliers. Bedrooms – some big, some smaller – come with pillow top mattresses, goose down duvets, crisp linen and Farrow & Ball colours. There's an honesty bar and an open fire in the sitting room, while breakfast is a feast. *Minimum stay two nights at weekends.*
